




Amidst the turbulence of the life cycles of all the sentient beings in the world, there was a person who stopped, meditated and then studied through to the core of Buddhism to bring peace to the world.

She did not know how to read and write, and she led a simple and easy life in her tiny Kuti, yet her knowledge was remarkable. She is the founder of Wat Phra Dhammakaya. She trained a group of people to spread Dhamma, the Teaching of the Buddha, in many countries. Her heart was so large, the whole world seems small in comparison. This person was Khun Yay Maharatana Upasika Chandra Khonnokyoong.

Her legendary life began on the bank of Nakhon Chaisri river. She was born in the early morning of January 20, 1909. She was the daughter of a farmer and had no chance to study in school, however, this never deterred her wish to learn --she made the vast paddy fields of her youth her school. When she was young, she often looked at the dawning sun and made a wish that someday she would go to reach it.

Her father passed away when she was only 13, and before she could ask for his forgiveness for any of her unintentional misdeeds. She made a resolution to reach her late father in his afterlife to apologise to him for her childhood wrongs. She grew up, worked diligently, and gave all her hard-earned money to her mother. She had no interest in decorating herself with fine clothes or perfume, as did the other village girls of her age. Not deterred by this world, she searched for a way to reach her father in the afterlife.


She was 26 when she left her family and her mother. She moved to Bangkok after hearing that the Great Abbot of Wat Paknam had re-discovered the Wisdom of Dhammakaya that included the knowledge of heaven and hell. She entered domestic service in


Bangkok seeking for someone who was practising meditation at Wat Paknam. Eventually, she discovered a family that had invited a nun from Wat Paknam, Thongsuk Samdaengpan, to teach meditation at their house. Khun Yay immediately applied to be a maid in their household, intending to practise meditation with the nun.

After practising meditation with Upasika Thongsuk for about two years, Khun Yay was able to attain the Wisdom of Dhammakaya. With the help and advice of the nun, she managed to harness the Wisdom of Dhammakaya to seek for her late father. Deeply realizing the value of Dhamma, she decided to ordain as a nun, and was taken by Upasika Thongsuk to meet the Great Abbot. Once she had paid homage to him, the Great Abbot's first words to her were, "what kept you so long?" Without further examination, he allowed her to join the most highly experienced group of meditation researchers in the temple. The following morning, Khun Yay was ordained.

Khun Yay was a very capable student, completing Luang Phor's assignments to the letter. Nothing Luang Phor asked her to do was beyond her ability. Luang Phor was not in the habit of praising his students, but once he praised Khun Yay publicly among the other disciples, saying she was "second to none".







The Successor of Vijja Dhammakaya




Before Luang Phor Wat Paknam passed away, he called all of his closest disciples together and gave an important audience. He declared that he would leave his body in the next 5 years. He instructed his followers to continue teaching people to attain the Wisdom of Dhammakaya, and to spread the tradition far and wide; since this would help bring peace to the minds of the people of the world. Luang Phor instructed Khun Yay to stay and teach Vijja Dhammakaya at Wat Paknam while waiting for the successor to arrive. Khun Yay lived her simple and peaceful life teaching meditation

and waiting for the destined person to arrive.

On October 1963, a university student came to her with a question that had remained in his mind since he was the age of 13. He asked, "What were we born for, and what is the real goal in life?" This person was the Venerable Dhammajayo, present supreme spiritual leader of Wat Phra Dhammakaya.

Khun Yay answered these questions so clearly he was convinced to study and practice Dhamma with her. He was diligent in his practice, and became an outstanding student. Later, he introduced some of his university friends, both male and female, senior and junior, to practice meditation at Khun Yay's place.












Khun Yay asked the Ven. Dattajeevo, then a lay-supporter, the amount of money that would be necessary to set up a good temple. The Ven Dattajeevo replied that it would be around 100 million Baht. Khun Yay then brought out the brown envelope she had been using for collecting donated money - there was only 3,200 Baht. The Ven. Dattajeevo questioned her, saying, "How can we build a temple with only 3,200 Baht?" Khun Yay asked him, "If you received a budget of 100 million Baht from the government for training people to be good men, and to devote their lives for Buddhism like you and the team; how many people would you get?" The Ven. Dattajeevo replied that we could not be certain of training even one good person, even if we had 100 million Baht. Khun Yay told him with a grin that she already had 11 good people, which was worth much more than 100 million Baht, and was certain they would

Every pioneer has to work hard. Every one of the canals in the temple compound needed to be dredged and excavated by the volunteers and every tree in the temple needed to be planted by hand. Many of the new planted saplings withered in the intense heat and needed to be replaced --sometimes three or four times. Khun Yay worked so hard that she became seriously under-nourished, and at one time came dangerously close to death. Only with the medical attention of a doctor from Chulalongkorn University Hospital did she recover and continue to participate in the life of the temple community.





Taking Luang Phor Wat Paknam's organization as an example, Khun Yay set the rules and regulations for the temple community. After the establishment of Wat Phra Dhammakaya Temple, Khun Yay gave all the authority to the Ven. Dhammajayo - the abbot. She then lived her simple life, following a fixed schedule. From four in the morning

until six, she would meditate alone. Before breakfast she would lead a group in a cleaning task. Around 8.30, she would again meditate, but this time as a teaching class for her students. In the evening she would walk or sit on her tricycle to inspect the cleanliness and orderliness of all things in the temple.









A Paragon of Exemplary Virtue




Khun Yay taught her students to think and speak and do only good and pleasant deeds. She will always be a role model in the hearts of her disciples, because she taught her disciples by example - not just by giving a talk. She told them again and again, "Do the best in this life so that there will be no need to redo it in the next life."

Khun Yay emphasised cleanliness. She explained that if

we live with an untidy environment, how can we shield our mind from untidy defilements? An example of her cleanliness is that when she cleaned a chair she did it thoroughly, from front to side to back, from left to right, from the top surface to the underside. All the temple tools and environment must be kept clean all day. She especially emphasised the cleanliness of the kitchen and the toilet because if we







can keep clean and tidy in the most unclean and untidy places then we can keep the whole area always clean.

From the very beginning, Khun Yay set strict temple regulations to protect the monks from weakening. The temple's main gate close and open at set times. No women are allowed in the area of a monk's residence. A monk must receive guests in public rooms rather than in his cell, and male and female meditators are segregated on either side of the Dhamma Hall. All these rules are in accordance with of Khun Yay's directives.




The Extension and Propagation




Khun Yay started the hard work of building Wat Phra Dhammakaya with her own money of 3,200 Baht and successfully brought construction to completion. She told Luang Phor Dhammajayo that once in her lifetime she would like to be a leader in a Kathina Dhana ceremony - the great giving to a monastery. In 1988 Luang Phor invited Khun Yay to do so. Khun Yay was overjoyed and traveled everywhere in

Thailand inviting her disciples and old friends to join her.

In the year 2000, when she was 83 years old, Khun Yay was the leader in a robe offering ceremony. Since then she always presided over the donors in the robe offering ceremony every year.








by the first Sapha Dhammakaya Hall, which had a simple thatched roof, but could seat 30,000.

With the steady increase of interested public coming to study meditation and training of the mind, the Ven. Dhammajayo led the way in the provision of purpose-built facilities to allow meditators to learn Dhamma with some degree of convenience. The World Dhammakaya Centre has been designed with a covered capacity of 300,000 and open-air capacity of 1,000,000 people.

The great Sapha Dhammakaya Hall was built for these purposes. The hall covers an area of over forty acres (312,984

square meters) on two levels. The structure can accommodate 300,000 people.

Khun Yay always reminded Luang Phor not to be concerned too much with the provision of infrastructure and facilities, and to let others do the job. Since the human life cycle is so short, people will be best at meditating if they start when they are in good health and at a younger age. Luang Phor undertook Khun Yay's words and tried his best to finish the construction as soon as possible.



The Establishment of A World Buddhist Centre





Phrarajbhavanavisudh had an idea to set up a centre for meditators all around the world to join meditation at the same time. Although Khun Yay had some feeling that this might be a great task and might delay Luang Phor from researching Vijja Dhammakaya, she realized the importance of the project to the Buddhist ministry to the world. Khun Yay helped Luang Phor by her power of meditation to search for meritorious persons and philanthropic donors to help Luang Phor build the Maha


Dhammakaya Cetiya - a centre for world peace and wisdom.

On the 8th of September 1995, the first pile of the Maha Dhammakaya Cetiya was driven into the ground to mark the beginning of this magnificent structure. Designed to last more than a thousand years, the Maha Dhammakaya Cetiya is a domeshaped pagoda enshrining one million Buddha images both inside and on the surrounding dome surface. The purpose of the construction is to be the focal landmark of the open-air congregation site. The broad steps of the Cetiya have been designed for a congregation of 10,000 monks. The surrounding grounds will be able to accommodate 1 million people from all over the world for spiritual activities contributing to world peace.

"Maha Dhammakaya Cetiya, the pagoda of the Triple Gems, is a spiritual centre for all humans and spiritual beings, the place

To show gratitude for the Great Teacher who rediscovered Vijja Dhammakaya, Phrarajbhavanavisudh (the Ven. Dhammajayo) and his disciples cast a statue of Luang Phor Wat Paknam in solid gold on Magha Puja Day 1994. The Phramonkokthepmuni Vihara, a Great Teacher Chapel, has been designed as the permanent home for his statue.

"The rediscovery of Vijia Dhammakaya means the return

of purity and wisdom into all humanity. When humans attain Dhammakaya, the secret to their own life and things around them will be revealed by the wisdom and the eyes of Dhammakaya.

For this reason, the founding of Phramonkolthepmuni Vihara is not just simply a permanent construction or a plain building as may seen --but is the place for enshrining the body of the Great Knower - Phramonkolthepmuni (Sod Candasaro) who rediscover *Vijja Dhammakaya*".


The Demise and Funeral



 \overline{K} hun Yay Maharatana Upasika Chandra Khonnokyoong passed away peacefully in the morning of 10th September 2000, at the age of 92.

Daily Abhidhamma Funeral Chanting was arranged from the 17th of September 2000 to the 2nd February 2001. Senior monks and executives of monastic orders from various temples throughout the country have performed the Buddhist rite of reciting Abhidhamma Chanting. There were 100 monks for working days and 200 monks for Sundays with thousands of laypeople also in attendance.

The cremation day for Khun Yay has been scheduled on the 3rd of February 2002 following Khun Yay's wish: "Do not











keep my body. Invite the monks to do the Abhidhamma chanting for a while, and then cremate my body"

Senior monks from 30,000 Buddhist temples all around the country, together with senior monks from 20 different countries all around the world, will be present in the final cremation ceremony before a hundred thousand laypeople. Khun Yay Maharatana Upasika Chandra Khonnokyoong was born an ordinary girl, a simple life in this wide world. But her becoming has changed a great deal in the world. Her life was gracious and unblemished. Her virtue and kindness will stay with us deep in our hearts through eternity.

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
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
